CHURCH COUNCIL minutes July 20, 2023 5:30 Meeting

Devotions by Pastor and Council

The meeting was called to order by President, Tim Kenyon with the following members in attendance: Jewel Baseley, Gary Boschee, Mike Linch, Raquel Linch, Sherri Nissen, and Deb Pantini. Sandi Sickels, Chris Lane, and Pastor Evan were absent.

Approve the agenda: M/S/C by Deb Pantini and Jewel Baseley with the following amendments: under new business: E. Executive meeting report, F. Thermostats, and G. Council members.

Approve June council minutes: M/S/C by Mike Linch and Gary Boschee with the following change: Gary Boschee was not in attendance at the June meeting.

Treasurer's Report by Mike Linch

Pastor's housing allotment from endowment of \$4,800 has been paid/caught up from eight quarters. (\$600 per quarter)

Expenses continue to exceed Contributions per month by approximately \$2,000. Questions of how to communicate this with the congregation. Consensus with the council is to put regular updates in the bulletin.

All bills are paid and current. Expenses have increased.

Old Business:

Electronic Offering: "Tithing through ELCA" only is free, but if we add other options/apps to use there is a cost. Further information is needed.

Venmo as an option we would need to have an old cell phone and number to use to activate google voice free of charge.

Christmas/Holiday Survey: Council members discussed information to include, paper ballots on colored paper will be placed in the weekly bulletins during September. One vote per member that can be placed in the offering plate. Ballots will be counted/discussed at the October council meeting.

New Business:

Election of Officers: M/S/C by Jewel Basely and Raquel Linch

Tim Kenyon -President, Gary Boschee – Vice President, Mike Linch – Treasurer, and Sherri Nissen as Secretary. Also adding Deb Pantini with the above officers as a council member to sign checks.

August Benevolence: M/S/C by Gary Boschee and Sherri Nissen to give to the Creston Area Food Pantry.

150th T-shirts: There are some left. Consensus from council is to place them on a table with free will offering, if any are left at the time of the garage sale they will be put on the sale.

Yearbook: the discussion came up due to publication being done after the annual meeting, but our church year with new officers starts in June. Earlier publication has old information so in the future the yearbook will be published in July. This year's updates will be on the member website.

Executive meeting report: The committee met with Pastor Evan July 19 to touch base on somethings. Items discussed include Pastor posting/keeping office hours. These will be placed on the south door, his office door, and in the newsletter. Visits/contacts with members outside of church. Advance notice of absences. Pastor would possibly like to do a book study with council members, and he welcomes anyone to pray with him/for him at any time. Overall, it was a positive meeting.

Thermostat setting/update: Brenda has noticed a difference in peak usage on certain days. Do we keep sanctuary doors open or closed – what is best for the organ. Tim will touch base with Elaine/Jodi. We may need to investigate new thermostats due to age and some that will measure humidity (purpose of keeping the organ at correct temp.)

Council Members: Our by-laws state we should have 11 and can have up to 12. We currently have 9. Please let a council member know if you are interested.

Christian Education:

Church Property: Trenching for the electrical sign and hook up is complete, as well as glazing of the upstairs windows. We will get updated pricing for the playground and begin that work, as it has had little repair since it was built. For safety reasons it needs to be rebuilt. Work on the sanctuary ceiling and lighting will begin in August and will take up to 2 weeks. Volunteers will be needed to move pews, etc at that time. Church services will need to be held in the fellowship hall or outside at that time.

Outreach Ministry: The Long Table Food Shelf is up has been well received by the community. The First Christian Church will participate now that they understand the process. We had six members help at the Food Pantry on July 16. A sign-up sheet for needed items has been placed in the Narthex as we will be serving One in Christ meals August 7th and 8th

Worship & Music: have been planning services through September. Elaine will be absent with Jodi covering all but one service while she is gone. Julie Weishaar-Mullin will play at that time.



SCHOOL KITS

- Four 70 sheet notebooks of wide or college ruled paper approximately 8x10; no loose-leaf paper
- One 30 centimeter ruler or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- ♦ One pencil sharpener
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- ♦ Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- ♦ Five blue or black ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- ♦ One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- ♦ One 2 ½" eraser

All items should be new. Any of these items you can donate will be greatly appreciated.

PERSONAL CARE KITS

- \wedge 1 light-weight bath-sized towel (20" x 40" to 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- \diamond · 2 bath-size bars of soap (4-5 oz.) any brand in original wrapping
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging (Multipacks may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope. No plastic baggies, please)
- ♦ 1 metal nail clippers, remove packaging
- One sturdy comb (no picks or fine toothed combs) remove packaging

BABY CARE KITS

- ♦ 2 swaddling blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel 36" to 52" square
- ♦ 2 pairs of socks
- ♦ 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or
- include a baby cap
- ⋄ 1 hand towel, dark color recommended
- \diamond · 2 or 3 bath-size bars (4-5 oz.) of gentle soap, in original wrapping

Bringing a baby into the world can be a difficult and scary thing for a mother living in poverty. Keeping anew baby healthy, clean, and comfortable can take a lot of resources. The items included in a Baby Care Kit provide the basics a family needs to care for their new members the way they hope to. Worry will always be present for all parents, but having some essentials allows them to enjoy and get to know their little ones and introduce them with pride to the world.





